

The Titan disaster





For the past few weeks much of the world has been transfixed by the Titan sub disaster which resulted in the loss of five lives. As with any vessel on the seas, perils always lurk but we do not stop venturing forth because of them.


The Titan was designed and built by OceanGate Inc and although the company claimed to have involvement of Boeing and NASA in the project, both those companies deny that. The 7 metre long vessel is constructed of titanium and carbon fibre. Originally she was used for dives off the coast of California, Mexico and in the Atlantic. She had dived to the wreck of the Andrea Doria off the coast of Massachusetts, which lies at a depth of a mere 70 metres. However, the Titanic is where the big tourist bucks are spent, and lies at 3800 metres. Pressure at that depth is approximately 400 times normal atmospheric pressure. The Titan had made 6 dives to the Titanic in 2021 and 7 in 2022; her last dive was the only one she made in 2023.

The Titan had 7 back-up systems to allow it to return to the surface including ballast, thrusters and an inflatable balloons. Although the thruster controller (pictured) looks like something from K-Mart, it is not unusual to use these on submersibles.

The fatal dive began at 930 AM on 18 June and lasted perhaps for less than 2 hours, with a possible implosion detected at that time. Death would have been instantaneous.

At 1:18 PM on 22 June the finding of a debris field was announced, located by a Remotely Operated Vehicle (ROV) launched from a research vessel. The identifiable debris consisted of the tail cone, and the forward and aft end bells and was approximately 500 metres from the bow of the Titanic.

There have been many comments about the safety and suitability of the Titan, including the use of carbon fibre and titanium sections, the relative strength of the Perspex window, the lack of certification of the vessel, and reports of incidents and unnerving noises that occurred



on previous dives. No doubt, the story is not yet over.
